1. Objectives of the Program

The degree scheme M.A. *English Linguistics* provides an in-depth understanding of issues in current linguistics and a training in the methods used in linguistic research. The combination of empirical research with theoretical modeling is an internationally renowned hallmark of linguistics in Tübingen, and the course structure of the M.A. *English Linguistics* reflects this research strength. In addition to the core areas of phonetics, morphology, syntax, and semantics, the program offers specializations in such areas as second language acquisition, information structure, language processing, experimental syntax, formal semantics, and psycholinguistics. The curriculum provides a thorough grounding in the description of English in cross-linguistic comparison, in the developing approaches to linguistic research, and in the key areas of theoretical and applied linguistics. This core program is complemented by an interdisciplinary component in which students can broaden their perspectives by studying courses from outside the English Department. They can thus extend their range of expertise into the linguistic analysis of other languages or broaden their knowledge about language studies in neighboring disciplines such as psychology, philosophy, cognitive science, and computational linguistics.

The M.A. *English Linguistics* has a strong emphasis on doing linguistics and doing research, rather than just learning about what others have done. Students develop, conduct, and evaluate their own research projects, one of which they fully develop in their final M.A. thesis. The degree scheme provides an opportunity for students to use the knowledge and skills that they gain in their courses in a work environment too. The Practice and Application module allows students to apply their competence in linguistic analysis, linguistic research, and critical thinking in an applied context (e.g., by carrying out an internship or teaching a tutorial).

Graduates of the M.A. *English Linguistics* are qualified for professional careers inside and outside academia. They have gained a profound understanding of different levels and categories of linguistic analysis, and can successfully apply linguistic techniques to investigate research questions in both theoretical and applied linguistics. They are able to critically reflect on and evaluate language phenomena and research results in core domains such as phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics and pragmatics, but also in the extended fields of second language acquisition, information structure, language processing, experimental syntax, formal semantics, and psycholinguistics.

The M.A. *English Linguistics* thus qualifies students for various career options. They can pursue an academic career by applying for a Ph.D. program in Linguistics or Cognitive Science, or they can use their linguistic and analytical skills for a non-academic career in fields related to language and communication. M.A. holders are able to work on linguistic topics at an academic level, they have learned to abstract and synthesize information, to evaluate explanations critically, and are competent in the planning and execution of research and project work. With these abilities, they are qualified for positions, among others, in publishing, language technology and teaching, translation agencies, and journalism.

However this degree scheme also has wider objectives. One important aim of the program's focus on linguistic analysis is to enable participants to see for themselves the many ways in which human language and the uses of language across the world are remarkably similar. While languages may vary along certain parameters, just as societies and aspects of culture can and do vary, many things remain surprisingly constant: the way children develop language, the sorts of things that people use language to say, the factors which affect language form, and the sorts of distinctions that languages encode are examples of this. The study of English Linguistics can thus offer a perspective into language as a common feature of humanity.

Another important insight which a study of Linguistics can offer is how people can say one thing but mean something else or something more (implicature), or alternatively seem to be saying something but retain deniability (presupposition). The sharpening of graduates' analysis of the components of meaning can afford them essential skills in negotiating the multiple information sources and media of today's world.

The order of written thesis and oral exam is determined by the student in consultation with the supervisor. The whole exam period without any extensions lasts a maximum of six months, beginning from registration. Of these, a maximum of four months is given for the written thesis, a maximum of two months for the preparation of the oral exam.

4. Final Grade

The final grade is calculated from the grades of modules ELI-MA-01 to ELI-MA-04 and ELI-MA-09. Module ELI-MA-09 (Master Thesis and Oral Exam) constitutes 50% of the final grade. Modules ELI-MA-01 to ELI-MA-04 make up the remaining 50%.
