When Identity Clashes with Interest: the China Complex in Taiwan

Over the past decade, Taiwan has witnessed a rising Taiwanese consciousness pulling it away from a Chinese identity. However, economic development across the Taiwan Strait unfolds in the opposite direction, drawing Taiwanese people into closer interactions with and dependence on China. As Taiwanese find it increasingly difficult to disentangle their complicated feelings toward China, this study sets out to demonstrate and explain the multifaceted nature of the Taiwanese people's conflicting views toward China. In particular, this talk examines whether the support for closer economic integration will increase the support for unification against the rising tide of Taiwan identity in recent decades.

Yang Wan-Ying is professor of the Department of Political Science, National Chengchi University, Taipei, Taiwan. After she received her Ph.D. from Michigan State University and returned to Taiwan in 1999, along with her teachings in the university, she has been actively engaged in women's movements and served as the board member of the Awakening Foundation from more than ten years. From 2013 till 2017 (Feb), she served as the chair of the department of Political Science, and then the deputy dean of the College of Social Sciences.

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
