'Wollamins': Korean Separated Families since the Korean Division

Abstract: The lecture will deal with the issue of separated families by raising two main questions concerning on the one hand, the typology of the separated families, and on the other hand, the periodic characteristics of Wollamin population and its migration motives. These considerations will allow us to draw a picture of the roles and meaning of Wollamin in South Korea.

Gwi-Ok Kim received Ph.D. of Sociology in Seoul National University and is a professor of sociology in the Department of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Hansung University, Korea. She is author of *Oral History: Methodology and Practice* (2014, in Korean), *Military and Sexual Violence* (2010, in Japanese), *War and Society in East Asia* (2009, in Korean), *Memories of War and Oral History of the Cold War* (2008, in Korean), *Methodology for Gender Studies and Social Analysis* (2006, in Korean), *New Perspective on Korean Diasporas within the Korean Peninsula* (2008, in Japanese and 2004, in Korean), and *The Identity and Life Experiences of Wollamin* (1999, in Korean).
