**Abstract:** This talk presents a synthetic view of the evolution of Korea's law and legal system during the last six hundred years. Of late legal history scholarship has taken a notable transnational turn. Modern Korea can be seen as the specimen of a successful conflation of different legal traditions of the world: Korean legal development illumines the logic and dynamic of law capable of creating a common legal framework and at the same time reflects the specificities of legal culture.

Marie Seong-Hak Kim is Professor of History at St. Cloud State University and Attorney at Law (Minnesota Bar). She is currently a Senior Fellow at Freiburg Institute for Advanced Studies at the University of Freiburg, and a Research Affliate at Institut d'Asie Orientale in France. She is the author of Law and Custom in Korea: Comparative Legal History (Cambridge University Press, 2012) and the editor of The Spirit of Korean Law: Korean Legal History in Context (Brill, 2016). Originally trained as a sixteenth-century French historian, she is also the author of Michel de L'Hopital: The Vision of a Reformist Chancellor during the French Religious Wars (Truman State University Press, 1997). Her research focuses on comparative legal history. She is working on two book projects, "The Courts in South Korea: Political Transitions and the Travail of Judges, 1945-2015" and "French Law in the Making: Custom, Society, and the State, 1450-1600," jumping back and forth between Europe and East Asia.
