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#### 1. Objectives of the Programme

Understanding the complexity of public policy in a fast-changing world is becoming ever more important for policymakers and analysts. The Master of Public Policy and Social Change (MPPSC) provides a first-class international Master's programme focusing on the analysis of public policies in the light of social changes and societal challenges. It offers BA graduates of political science, sociology and related social-science disciplines a consecutive Master's programme. The programme provides students with knowledge of the relevant sociological and political science theories and methodological skills enabling them to analyse and critically assess policies and social change. A core element of the programme will be its international comparative focus. Students will be able to critically assess the performance of countries and effectiveness of policies in dealing with social change and societal and economic challenges. The guiding principles of the course are research excellence, societal relevance, and ethical responsibility.

To enable students to conduct international comparative analyses, the programme will provide students with advanced skills in qualitative and quantitative methods. In applied seminars, students will be acquainted with the theoretical and analytical skills to interpret empirical findings and communicate them to decision makers. At its core, the Master of Public Policy and Social Changes is based on three pillars: a) (comparative) public policy analysis; b) the analysis of social structures and social change; and c) advanced methods.

In addition to the core obligatory courses within the three pillars, students can choose from various specialisation courses in comparative public policy and the analysis of social inequalities and the effectiveness of interventions. Furthermore, students will have the opportunity to choose from interdisciplinary electives from a wide range of subjects in (a) political science (for instance, comparative politics, ethics and sustainability), (b) sociology (for instance urban sociology, and sociology of migration) and (c) other disciplines and subjects, such as economics and languages.

The programme trains highly-motivated international students in analysing processes of social change in European societies and the public policies to meet challenges at the national, regional and global level. The MPPSC will enable graduates to become the policy analysts of tomorrow, for a world better governed. Graduates of the MPPSC will be able to assess the outcomes of existing national and supra-national public policies and develop evidence-based policy instruments needed to address future challenges. They will be able to select and apply the most appropriate methods, frameworks and tools for social and policy analysis.

**Entry requirements** for this Master's course are: a) a bachelor degree in political science, sociology, economics or related social science discipline (GPA: 2.0 based on the German grading system or equivalent); b) students will have a basic knowledge of empirical social research and statistics; and c) students will be proficient in English (level B2/C1 or equivalent).

**Mobility options:** Students planning to include an exchange semester in their studies are required to seek guidance from the Programme Lead of the MPPSC.
