Aim of the conference

Stylistic analysis is an essential tool for the interpretation of the origins and date of artifacts and the reconstruction of contacts and relations. However, in the broader disciplines of art history and archaeology, there has been a long-running debate about the concept of style that has challenged many assumptions underlying stylistic analysis.

Recently, Near Eastern art history has also begun to wrestle with these important theoretical and methodological problems, questioning the methods of connoisseurship and attribution studies and the debatable equation of style with ethnicity or local identity. Emerging perspectives interpret stylistic similarities and differences as denoting historically contingent communities networks of practice that could be dispersed, shifting, and overlapping, rather than discrete Shared socio-cultural groups. stylistic practices are considered not as passive reflections of these communities, but as an active means of social boundary and identity construction and negotiation.

It is the goal of this conference to explore and define the emerging paradigm shift in ancient Near Eastern art history and archaeology in the treatment of style and stylistic analysis, special reference to the highly interconnected visual cultures of the Late Bronze and Iron Ages.
