Islamic Theology – Past, Present & Future

Global Challenges and Prospective Synergies in the Academic Study of Islam

The academic study of Islam is currently faced with the changing configuration of its hermeneutical and institutional outlook. This is evidenced partly in the countervailing and interdisciplinary discourses of the modern research university which shift the focus from the philological study of religious literature to the cultural and sociological study of Muslim societies. At the same time, the establishment of confessionally orientated Centers of Islamic Theology in Germany have introduced the potential for new approaches to the academic study of Islam. This situation constitutes new challenges for the academic community, but it likewise creates new synergies which open interdisciplinary possibilities and the prospect of studying Islam in its multidimensionality. Against this dynamic backdrop, this international and interdisciplinary conference aims at presenting various fields of interaction between "Islamwissenschaft" (Oriental and Islamic studies) and "Islamische Theologie" (Islamic heology) according to the thematic focus of the Center for Islamic Theology (ZITh) in Tübingen. It brings together a propitious gathering of scholars to address the emerging questions that this unique intellectual situation offers and asks how and what this may mean for the study of Islam today.
