I. Content and Goal of Study

The B.A. program, Interdisciplinary American Studies, combines the traditional study of American literature with new approaches in social and cultural studies. Thus, not only does the program cover the broad range of American literary history, spanning from the colonial period to the present, it also engages with many cultural documents and events that are thus partially revealed. American Studies as such examines the various forms of American culture and the central questions raised by its heterogeneity, its differences and ethnic variety, and its own, unified, political self-understanding. The curriculum corresponds to the diversity of lived- experiences in multi-ethnic America and seeks to consider a full range of texts, from literary works to political rhetoric to the products of popular culture. In addition, it is an interdisciplinary program, combining the study of American literature and culture with the opportunity to attend U.S.-related events and choose electives in other subjects, especially history and political science. An optional year abroad provides the opportunity to further one's specialization and individualize one's program of study.

The Bachelor program is not only for those seeking academic careers in the field of American Studies, but is also designed to prepare students for various professional fields.

II. Prerequisites of the Program

- a) The B.A. Interdisciplinary American Studies begins every winter and summer semester.

III. Structure, Curriculum, and Workload

a) Structure of the Program

The B.A. Program Interdisciplinary American Studies consists of four segments:

- Core Curriculum (*Kern-Curriculum*)
 - Literary Studies (*Literaturwissenschaft*)
 - Cultural Studies (*Kulturwissenschaft*)
- Elective Curriculum (Wahlpflichtbereich)
- Academic English (*Sprachpraxis*)
- Transferable Skills (*Berufsfeldorientierte Kompetenzen*)

The Elective Curriculum offers students the opportunity to choose to study US-related subjects in other disciplines such as history, media studies, political science, or art history, among others. The Elective Curriculum is an integrative part of the Mono-Bachelor program. Thus, there is no additional minor subject (*Nebenfach*). The B.A. Program may be completed in either three or four years. This additional year may be spent outside of the university. Students may visit one of our numerous partner universities in the US and Canada as an exchange student, or they may choose to complete a job-related internship in Germany or abroad. A combination of both is also possible.

b) Curriculum of the Program

In their first and second years, students will choose one basic and one advanced module in each of the academic areas above. In their third year, students have two options. They may continue their studies at the University of Tübingen, attending three focus modules, and finally submitting their B.A. thesis to complete the program. Alternatively, students may choose the "mobility option" to add a year to their program and go abroad and/or do an internship. Students who go abroad in their third year will return to Tübingen for their fourth year to finish their studies with three focus modules and their B.A. thesis.

Students in the B.A. Program Interdisciplinary American Studies must successfully complete all of the required modules in each of the academic areas in order to earn a total of 159 ECTS credit points. In addition, students must successfully complete 21 ECTS credit points of transferable skills. Should students choose to take advantage of the mobility option during their third year of studies, they must earn 60 ECTS credit points while abroad.

IV. Language of Instruction and Examinations

Classes and tests are usually completed in English. Certain events, classes, and tests, however, may be held in German. The course catalogue will always include information on the language of instruction.

V. Orientation Examination

The orientation examination is usually completed at the end of the second semester. At the latest, it be completed at the end of the third semester. The examination consist of graded examinations of the following areas:

- Basic Module Literary Studies
- Basic Module Cultural Studies
- Basic Module Academic English

VI. Intermediate Examination

The intermediate examination is usually completed at the end of the fourth semester.

- a) The intermediate examination consist of graded examinations of the following areas:
 - Advanced Module Literary Studies
 - Advanced Module Cultural Studies
 - One graded course from the Perspective Module Elective Curriculum
 - Advanced Module Academic English
- b) The Advanced Modules of literary and cultural studies are completed with three different tests. Each module requires one written term paper. In addition and after completing the Advanced Module in Literary Studies and the Advanced Module in Cultural Studies, a joint oral exam is required. This 30-minute exam focuses on a theme from the field of literary studies and a theme of cultural studies. The subjects of the oral test must not be identical with those of the written examinations. For more information see module descriptions.

VII. Mobility Option

Students have until the end of the fourth semester to decide whether or not they will choose to take the "mobility option in order to be geographically, academically and/or professionally 'mobile.'" This option will grant them two additional semesters, (i.e. semesters 5 and 6 are spent utilizing the mobility option, while semesters 7 and 8 take place upon the student's return to Tübingen). During their mobility option, students must earn 60 ECTS credit points. Afterward, they return to the University of Tübingen for their seventh and eighth semester to continue and conclude their studies. If students do not choose the mobility option, they finish their studies after six semesters.

For the mobility option, students may choose from the following options, which may also be chosen in combination with one another:

a) GoingAbroad

All students of Interdisciplinary American Studies are strongly encouraged to spend a period of time in an English-speaking country. This is an invaluable opportunity for students to improve their language skills and to immerse themselves in a different culture and professional and/or academic environment. With our integrated mobility option in the third year, we offer our students the opportunity to partake in the university's established exchange program, which maintains close ties to more than fifty universities in the United States and Canada, as well as in other English-speaking countries. b) Internship

An internship of the student's choosing may provide them with invaluable insight into one or several professional fields and give them the opportunity to acquire professional skills. Students who are funded by the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (*BAföG*) should note that an internship abroad can only be funded by BAföG only if it lasts at least three months.

c) Extending Studies at the University of Tübingen

Students who have taken the mobility option may extend their studies at the University of Tübingen for one additional academic year.

VIII. Final Bachelor's Examination and Grading

- a) The final "examination" consists of graded exams in the following subjects as well as a written thesis: Final tests are required on the following modules:
 - Focus Module Literary/Cultural Studies
 - Lecture Series Literary/Cultural Studies
 - Focus Module Elective Curriculum
 - Focus Module Academic English

Twelve credit points will be awarded for the successful completion of a B.A. written thesis. The paper must be roughly thirty pages in length and examine questions, problems, or developments in American literature or culture. It must be completed in consultation with a member of the academic staff of the American Studies Department. Before beginning to write their thesis, students must register their intent to write. The thesis is to show that the student is able to work independently, demonstrating an understanding of scholarly methods that are used to approach a problem, and the ability to adequately support a conclusion. This thesis and its guidelines are in accordance with the standard regulations for examinations.

- b) Before registering for their B.A. thesis, students must have successfully completed the following components of the B.A. program:
 - Orientation Examination (*Orientierungsprüfung*)
 - Intermediate Examination (Zwischenprüfung)
 - Focus Module Literary/Cultural Studies
 - Focus Module Elective Curriculum
 - Transferable Skills
- d) The final grade of the B.A. degree consists of the following components:

Module content:	In this module, which builds off of the skills acquired in the Basic Module, comprehensive knowledge of the field of American literature is taught. First, the classes address theories and methods of literary analysis and models of literary theory. Second, the courses are designed to look at text in relation to theoretical models such as gender studies, ethnic studies, and cultural studies.
Course goals:	After completion of the module, students may complete a historically and theoretically informed analysis of a literary text. In addition, they can recognize and articulate its importance as a poetic and cultural system of signs. Students will ab able to develop questions and use various theories to deal with those questions independently.

In addition, students will complete a 30-minute oral examination on a topic from literary studies and a topic from cultural studies, which are not the same as the subject of the papers. They learn to critically apply literary and cultural theory and ask probing questions.

Module content:	The lecture series provides an overview of the history of American literature and culture. The series has a four-semester cycle. Literary, visual, and cultural phenomena are represented in their phases of development and considered in the context of social change. Where possible, assessment of current research will be included. Students also deepen their knowledge of the topic by reading primary and secondary texts during the semester and over holidays.
Course goals:	After completion of this module, students will be familiar with key periods and trends of development in American literature and cultural history. They understand the dimensions of these trends and are able to reflect critically on their results. Students build on the lecture with independent reading of exemplary texts of different phases of American literature and culture, whereby they employ their critical assessment.

Type of course	Practical class
Module content:	In this course, students will be introduced to resources, techniques, and strategies for independent language learning. In addition, they will review key areas of English grammar, sentence structure, and vocabulary, which is necessary for University-level speaking, listening, reading and writing. In turn, they will learn and practice basic conventions of academic reading and essay writing, which includes basic textual organization, close and critical reading skills, response to a text, and methods of quotation and citation from a text in MLA style. Students are expected to be able to assess their current level of proficiency, set goals for improving their weaknesses, and monitor their own progress as they work towards meeting their goals.
Course goals:	To improve students' listening, reading and writing in preparation for academic study, to review and improve key areas of grammar, vocabulary and sentence structure, and to begin thinking about language learning styles and strategies for improving language skills and becoming a more independent learner.
