Without order or narrative? Reading Latin Text Collections

Event 3: 14-16 September 2022 Collingwood College Penthouse A/B

The *LTC project* examines strategies used to design ancient and early Medieval Latin text collections. In our second on-line event in April 2021, we looked at a range of genres, including Augustan poetry, the codex Salmasianus, epistolography, Aulus Gellius, Apuleius, Suetonius, and the Historia Augusta. For the third event in September 2022, Peter Heslin has applied a machine learning algorithm to collections of poetry and epistolography, in which the computer attempts to classify items into their correct books. We ask:

- what can the resulting data tell us about the distinctiveness, coherence, unity or meaning of a collection? including formally negative results on a lack of distinctiveness
- what can the data not tell us (or what is the data not telling us) about the distinctiveness, coherence, unity or meaning of a collection?
- what other approaches or questions might be necessary for understanding the distinctiveness, coherence, unity or meaning of a collection? E.g. narratology, or study of geography, sequencing, addressee or imagery?
- are these other approaches complementary and supplementary to the data? Or do they contradict the data in any significant way?

A range of papers at the event will contextualize and supplement the data in other ways.
