## Epigraphy, the Qur'ān, and the Religious Landscape of Arabia

This three-day international conference brings together specialists in epigraphy as well as scholars of the Qur'ān and historians of early Islam. It aims at exploring how recent epigraphic and archaeological findings and research have been changing our understanding of the Qur'ān and the Arabian religious, cultural, and political landscape.

This conference is organised within the ERC funded project, 'The Qur'an as a Source for Late Antiquity' (QaSLA), directed by Professor Holger Zellentin.

QaSLA considers the Qur'ān as witness to the history of Judaism and Christianity. It examines the Qur'ān as a primary literary source that facilitates the study of the religious landscape of the Arabian Peninsula, and investigates the Qur'ān's testimony to the religious culture of Judaism and Christianity throughout Late Antiquity from a new perspective.
