About 60 years ago, when Perry Miller, an important scholar of American Studies, edited his anthology *Major Writers of America*, his list of authors that any student of American literature should read comprised only 23 authors. They were all white, and there was only one woman among them, Emily Dickinson. Today, the canon has been considerably expanded, and nobody can read everything that is worth reading because our ideas of what is considered worth reading have changed completely. Just thinking about what one could (or should) read can be overwhelming. Therefore, we have put together a list with suggestions. We have been really selective and made some tough choices, but it is still very long. You won't be able to read all of it, but we encourage you to read as many texts as possible during your time at university (and afterwards). Give it a try, and we are sure you will enjoy it.
