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1. The Program

1.1 Introduction

The B.A. program in Interdisciplinary American Studies (IAS) offers students a strong core curriculum of courses in Literary and Cultural Studies and a flexible Elective Curriculum incorporating related disciplines such as history, political science, media studies or sociology. The program aims at enabling students to apply the tools and approaches developed by different disciplines to advance a critical understanding of the American experience in a global context. The program considers a wide variety of culturally significant texts and media, from literary works to political rhetoric to the products of popular culture (television, film, music, social media), covering American history in its entirety from colonial times to the present. The strong English-language component of the program prepares students to communicate and express themselves in excellent English.

Regardless of whether they pursue careers within academia or in wider professional areas, graduates have acquired a sensitivity to issues of the colonial past and its current manifestations, the place, often hierarchical and unequal, of the races, ethnicities, and cultures in the U.S. and crucial questions about values such as pluralism, tolerance, social justice and democratic participation. Graduates combine cultural, historical, and linguistic knowledge with an awareness of the critical potential of the humanities within a conflict-ridden and unequal world, and thus are equipped to reflect critically about and respond creatively to the acute challenges of the contemporary moment.

Students in the B.A. program with the integrated year abroad gain an extra year to study abroad and/or do an (international) internship.

1.2 Objectives of the Program

Graduates of the B.A. in Interdisciplinary American Studies are familiar with key concepts, theories and methodologies in Literary Studies, Cultural Studies, and related disciplines in the field of American Studies and possess a basic knowledge of important developments and texts in American literary, cultural, and socio-political history from the colonial period to the present. They can recognize problems and fields in need of interdisciplinary cooperation, and they have experience with interdisciplinary approaches and methods.

Graduates can apply the methodological tools of American Studies in independent research projects: They can formulate relevant research questions and use different theories and methods to answer them; they can find and analyze/interpret primary sources and pertinent secondary literature; they can present their results in clear, structured, and well-argued prose.

Graduates have attained advanced proficiency in the English language at level C1 of the Common European Framework (CEFR).

Graduates of the 4-year Interdisciplinary American Studies program with integrated year abroad have gained extensive experience studying in a different academic environment or doing an internationally oriented internship.

Graduates can apply the insights and academic skills of American Studies in different professional environments and intercultural contexts.

The B.A. in Interdisciplinary American Studies qualifies students for M.A. programs in American Studies, and related M.A. programs in Literary and/or Cultural Studies, Area Studies, Journalism, and International Relations.

1.3 Structure and Curriculum

The B.A. in Interdisciplinary American Studies is a mono-bachelor program, meaning that students will not have to choose an additional minor (*Nebenfach*). The program can be completed in either three or four years (depending on the extra integrated year abroad). The IAS program begins every winter and summer semester. The language of instruction is English. However, certain events, classes, and tests may be held in German. The course catalogue will always include information on the language of instruction.

The IAS program consists of four main parts: the Core Curriculum in Literary and Cultural Studies, the Elective Curriculum, Academic English, and Professional Skills.

Core Curriculum

During the first year, the basic modules in Literary and Cultural Studies will introduce students to the main methods and concepts used to study American literature and culture. Each of these modules consists of a lecture and a seminar, accompanied by a tutorial. In the advanced and focus modules, students deepen their knowledge of American literature and culture and apply and enhance the skills acquired in the basic modules in a series of thematic seminars. The lecture series “Issues in American Literary and Cultural History” provides an overview of the history of American literature and culture, enabling students to identify connections between these fields.

Elective Curriculum

Students enjoy a high degree of autonomy in selecting topics for the three modules of the Elective Curriculum. Depending on their interests, students can take courses in fields as diverse as history, media studies, political science, sociology, art history, economics, or law. These courses are outside of the core curriculum but should either relate to the study of America or deal with theories and concepts that are relevant to American Studies. Enrollment in courses outside the English Department cannot be guaranteed and depends on the availability of places.

Academic English

Along with knowledge of the subject matter and theoretical background related to the program of studies, students acquire advanced English language skills in Written & Oral Communications courses, with the option of taking a translation course towards the end of their studies.

Professional Skills

Professional Skills (*Schlüsselqualifikationen*) are career-oriented skills. Students have a number of options to acquire a total of 21 ECTS credits in Professional Skills: The University's Transdisciplinary Course Program offers a wide range of courses on journalism, digital humanities, international business and management, rhetoric and communication, programming, and many other subjects. In addition, students can get credits for language

courses at the university's Language Center. Students are strongly encouraged to use up to a maximum of 10 ECTS credits in Professional Skills for an internship. A full-time internship lasting at least six weeks will be awarded 10 ECTS credit points. Students should consult with a student advisor to ensure that an internship is suitable; they have to hand in a 1.500-word internship report and a proof of internship letter from their employer no later than 12 weeks after the end of the internship.

1.4 Module Deadlines, Bachelor Thesis and Grading

Module Deadlines

The following modules must be completed by the end of the third semester.:

- IAS_BA_01: Basic Module: Literary Studies
- IAS_BA_02: Basic Module: Cultural Studies
- IAS_BA_03: Academic Writing I

Bachelor Thesis and Grading

12 ECTS credit points will be awarded for the successful completion of the Bachelor Thesis. The Bachelor Thesis examines questions, problems, or developments in American literature or culture and is approximately 30 pages long (i.e. regularly formatted text not including bibliography). The thesis must be written in consultation with an American Studies instructor within a 10-week period. Before beginning to write their thesis, students must register their intent to start the writing process with their supervisor.

Before registering for their B.A. thesis, students must have successfully completed the following components of the B.A. program:

- All Basic and Advanced Modules (IAS_BA_01 – IAS_BA_09)
- IAS_BA_10: Focus Module: Themes in Literary and Cultural Studies
- IAS_BA_11: Focus Module: Research in Literary and Cultural Studies

1.5 Integrated Year Abroad

All students of Interdisciplinary American Studies are strongly encouraged to study in an English-speaking country. This is an invaluable opportunity for students to improve their language skills and to immerse themselves in a different culture and academic environment. Students can decide to choose the integrated year abroad until the end of the fourth semester. However, since the application process takes about a year, we recommend applying by the

end of the second semester to be able to spend semesters 5 and 6 abroad. During their year abroad, students must earn 60 ECTS credit points.

For the integrated year abroad, students may choose from the following options, which may also be chosen in combination with one another:

a) Studying Abroad

We offer our students the opportunity to partake in the university's established exchange program, which maintains close ties to more than fifty universities in the United States and Canada, as well as in other English-speaking countries. The application process starts about a year in advance, with a deadline of August 1 for an exchange starting in the winter semester of the following year. b) Internship in Germany or Abroad

One or more internships of the student's choosing will provide them with invaluable insights into one or several professional fields and give them the opportunity to acquire professional skills and experience. Students are strongly encouraged to do internships in an English-speaking country. Students who are funded by the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BAföG) should note that an internship abroad can be funded by BAföG only if it lasts at least three months.

1.6 Career Opportunities

Students in American Studies develop the skills – critical thinking and analysis, research design and synthesis, academic writing and presentation, intercultural competence – that will prepare them for a variety of careers in academic research and teaching, publishing, journalism, new media, cultural management, public administration, international organizations, consulting, and marketing and sales. Graduates with an average grade of 2,5 or higher are qualified for the M.A. program in American Studies, as well as (depending on the specific admission requirements) related M.A. programs in Literary and/or Cultural Studies, Area Studies, Journalism, and International Relations.

Content	In this module, students deepen their knowledge of specific aspects of American literature and culture before and after the Civil War. The module addresses theories and methods of literary and cultural analysis and familiarizes students with interdisciplinary practices in American Studies using, for example, gender studies or ethnic studies. One seminar must focus on the period before the Civil War; the other seminar on the period after the Civil War. Students should take both seminars during the same semester because of the joint oral exam.

Content	The lecture series provides an overview of the history of American literature and culture. The series has a four-semester cycle. Students must attend three of the four semesters of the lecture and hand in a portfolio for each of the three lectures at the end of the semester in which they take the lecture. Literary, visual, and cultural phenomena are represented in their phases of development and considered in the context of social change. Where possible, assessment of current research will be included. Students also deepen their knowledge of the topic by self-study of primary and secondary texts. Students will register for the exam during their third lecture and will contact one of the designated examiners to arrange for the oral exam covering all three lectures.								
Objectives	After completion of this module, students will have an overview of key periods and trends in American literary and cultural history as well as a detailed knowledge of selected issues in American Studies. Students are able to contextualize and critically discuss exemplary texts of different phases of American literature and culture.
