

Contracts with authors and editors for SFB 1070

All publications of SFB 1070 RESOURCECULTURES will be released within the series of publications of the same name. They will be provided as classical print, as well as online OpenAccess digital versions. The university as a publisher implemented strict regulations in regard of copyrights for texts and images. As editors working within this system of university publishing we have to follow these rules exactly. This includes the necessity to sign standardised contracts with authors of individual works, regardless whether they appear as monographs or articles in edited volumes. In addition, contracts with the editors of edited volumes have to be made.

In these contracts only a one-time, non-recurring right of publication for the individual work is transferred to the publisher (SFB 1070/ University of Tübingen). All other rights, including the copyrights on self-produced images and texts, stay with the author only.

With regard to images, tables, charts, graphs etc. (called 'images' in the following), which are not self-produced, there are strict regulations to be followed. For all images not created by the author himself for the work in question, a written permission of the copyright holder has to be obtained and provided for the editorial staff. This applies also for authors own images already published elsewhere. The task of gaining and presenting the written permissions lies with the authors.

These measures aim at providing legal security for authors and editors. They became inevitable because of current developments in legislation.

The affirmation of having asked for permission, included in the contract, does not absolve from the responsibility to provide written proof of the permissions to use images.

The Creative Commons (CC) license used for all publications of the SFB is to provide legal security for the established scientific practice of enabling other authors to quote from the work under the condition that a full and correct quote is provided. This covers texts only, images are excluded from the CC license. Their copyright lies with the author exclusively, meaning that third parties have to ask him for the permission to use them.
