De/Sacralization of Texts

The DFG research group works on the question of the authority of texts, which we seek to describe and theoretically define in more detail from a heuristic perspective as processes of sacralization and desacralization. The joint research programme is based on the observation that certain texts circulate within societies and groups and can be described as important reference texts for individual and social questions of orientation. These texts emerge through increased attributions of meaning - they establish themselves as important referents, but they can also lose meaning. Furthermore, these texts compete with each other, and their interpretation is disputed. They partially also develop an identity-forming significance for individuals and groups and can fulfil contradictory functions by supporting or also questioning norms, institutions, and authorities. So-called sacred writings of religious communities also fall into this dynamic perspective. Moreover, it can be shown that within these scriptures, some texts develop greater or lesser meaning, or none at all. We therefore use the concept of *sacrality* as a heuristic concept for the texts we have selected, without categorically distinguishing between religious and non-religious, profane and sacred texts. At the conference, we would like to discuss the research programme together with colleagues from the participating disciplines. The questions we are particularly interested in are aimed at the core of our programme:

- What is the added value of using the concept of sacrality or de/sacralization to describe ways of using texts? This question arises against the background of established concepts such as auratisation, canonisation, claims to authority, inspiration, revelation (according to each discipline).
- What is the added value of focusing on dynamic processes instead of a static understanding of sacrality or profanity?
- What is the added value of analysing texts as text-in-use configurations while also aiming to make visible the interconnectedness of text qualities and modes of use?
