## Application deadlines

**Please note the earlier nomination and application deadline from previous years due to high demand for student accommodation.**

Late applications will be considered if there is enough processing time.

### Semester 1 (February–June)

Nominations are due by **15 October**, applications and documents are due by **30 October**.

### Semester 2 (July–November)

Nominations are due by **30 March**, applications and documents are due by **15 April**.



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## Nomination information

Exchange/Study Abroad partners are required to nominate to UWA **first**, and students will then receive two emails:

1. To set up an account
2. To complete an application

To nominate a student for Semester 2 2024 or Split Year 2024/2025, please complete the unique [Semester 2 2024 or Split Year 2024/2025 nomination form](#). Please note a new link will be shared for nominations in 2025.

## Supporting documents

All supporting documentation must be **uploaded** to the online application:

- A colour copy of the student's passport details page
- The student's most recent **official** academic transcript. Postgraduate students must also submit their undergraduate transcript. All transcripts must be in English
- Evidence of English Language Competency
- Students can upload documents onto their online application after they have submitted their application

Applications will only be assessed once **all** documentation has been received.

## Academic information

### Standard academic load per semester

= 24 credit points.

Most units have a value of 6 credit points.

If home University permits, students may elect to take 18 credit points. This is still considered a fulltime study load for student visa purposes and will be counted as one semester place.

24 cp = 30 ECTS/15 US cp

18 cp = 22.5 ECTS/12 US cp

**NOTE:** The term 'unit' at UWA refers to an individual class, e.g. ENVT2250 Ecology.

Postgraduate units: Level 4 or 5 (e.g. MGMT5511)





## Academic requirements

To be eligible to study at UWA, you must meet the following:

### Undergraduate students

- Completion of one semester of study.
- Be in Good Academic Standing as determined by the UWA's partner university.
- Meet UWA's [English language requirements](#).

### Postgraduate students

- Completion of a bachelor's degree (or equivalent) in order to take classes at a postgraduate level.

**MBA students:** To be admitted as an Exchange or Study Abroad student into the [UWA \(Flexible\) MBA program](#) (offered on a trimester basis), students must have a minimum of two years' professional work experience and an IELTS of 7. Exchange/Study Abroad students are not eligible to enter into the full-time MBA.

### Academic restrictions

Units in the **Medical** and **Dentistry Schools** and **postgraduate** units in the **School of Psychological Sciences** are not available to Exchange/Study Abroad students. **Postgraduate** units (JD, Master) in the School of Law and **undergraduate** units in the **School of Psychological Sciences** are strictly limited to students meeting unit pre-requisites.

Students may apply to take any other units in a standard course that they meet the prerequisites for. A few units may be (quota) restricted.

### Grading scale

The number of credits or units required for completion of a student's first (or equivalent of bachelor's) degree varies depending on the [degree](#).

### Registration / Enrolment

Students will be requested to select and submit units around the same time as the application is due. They can enrol prior to arrival and a few weeks before the semester commences. On-campus enrolment support and academic advice is offered during Orientation. The add/drop period is open for the first week of classes.



## English proficiency

Students for the exchange program to UWA must satisfy one of the standard English Language Competency (ELC) requirements set out below, or such other language proficiency requirements as specified in a formal Memorandum of Agreement.

### UWA standard English Language competency requirements:

- IELTS: 6.5 (no band below 6.0).
- TOEFL (iBT): 82 (with minimum scores of 22 Writing, 18 Reading, 20 Speaking and 20 Listening).

### Alternative English Language pathway

Students who do not meet the standard ELC requirements as set out above may be approved admission to UWA on the basis of the Alternative English Language competency requirements.

Students seeking admission via this pathway are assessed on a case-by-case basis and, if approved, will receive a **conditional offer** where they must enrol in the following unit in their first semester enrolment: **Professional and Academic Communication** ([PACM1100](#))

Alternative ELC requirements for this conditional offer are:

- IELTS: 6.0 (no band below 5.5)
- TOEFL (iBT): 70 (minimum 20 Writing, 14 Reading, 19 Speaking and 17 Listening)
- [UWA CELT](#): English Academic Pathway 65% (no band less than 60%), Bridging Course Module 1 65% (no band less than 60%)

### English language bridging courses

Students who do not meet these ELC pathway requirements may consider enrolling in the 20-week [Academic English Bridging Course](#). Tuition fees are payable but discounts and [packages](#) may be available for partner university students.



## Welcome to UWA

### Arrival and Orientation

#### Recommended arrival dates:

Students should arrive a day or two before Orientation if housing has already been pre-arranged. We recommend that students who have not secured any housing arrive at least two weeks before classes start.

#### Orientation week

Commences the week prior to semester commencement:

Semester 2, 2024: **Monday 15 July**

Semester 1, 2025: **Monday 17 February**

Semester 2 2025: **Monday 14 July**

#### Cost of Orientation program

Not applicable, but optional excursions will incur a small fee.

## Accommodation

### On campus accommodation

Accommodation is available to new commencing students at one of the on campus residential colleges in [College Row](#), or at one of the three [Perth city](#) student housing options.

As with many cities around the world, the housing market in Perth is now extremely tight. UWA's accommodation options fill up quickly. Applying for housing *as early as possible* is strongly advised.

### College accommodation application process

Students can log onto the [UWA Residential College Application Portal](#) and apply to all of College Row in one place. Students rank their college preferences from 1-5 and the portal will automatically send their application to the colleges (starting with their first preference). Students should apply for accommodation as early as possible. There is a fee for the housing application.

### Off-campus

- WHV students are not entitled to Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) but must accept the responsibility to arrange their own [health cover](#) and acknowledge that they must cover their own expenses while in Australia.
- Students will not be covered by the Education for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act which protects the interests of overseas students studying in Australia.

## Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Overseas Student Health Cover ([OSHC](#)) is an Australian Student Visa requirement. Further information is available at the [Department of Home Affairs](#).

UWA can arrange OSHC for students through [Medibank](#). Alternatively, students can purchase their own through one of the Australian Government [approved providers](#). Students must provide evidence of this when submitting their acceptance documents.

Most students from Sweden, Norway and Belgium do not have to purchase OSHC. New Zealand and Australian citizens who are eligible for Medicare do not require OSHC.

Are students able to apply for an insurance waiver if they have their own insurance coverage? No.

*OSHC is an Australian Government student visa requirement.*

## Student life

### Student visa information

Are students required to obtain a student visa?

*Yes. Once students return the signed acceptance contract with applicable payment, UWA will issue a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) document which will allow students to apply for an Australian Student Visa Non-Award sector. Visas can take 2–4 weeks to be approved.*

Are students permitted to work?

*Students on an ASV can work up to 48 hours per fortnight during semester and unlimited hours*

*during University holidays.*

### Working Holiday Visa (WHV)

### Fees other than tuition (e.g. student services)

There is a compulsory Student Services and Amenities Fee ([SSAF](#))\*

\*Exchange students are exempt from paying the SSAF but the fee is applicable to Study Abroad students and must be paid during the semester. Failure to pay fees will encumber the student and it will not be possible to release their transcript at the end of the program.

## Transcripts

[Transcripts](#) will be sent to the student's *personal email address* at the completion of the exchange period (either August or January).
