Taking a socio-political approach, this lecture connects the current crisis of international law and institutions to deeper-seated political and ethical struggles about the constitution of international order.

His work sits at the intersection of law, ethics, and politics at the global level, exploring how international law and institutions shape, and are shaped by, changing ideas and patterns of global order.
